Project UNIFY Description for Hannah Caldwell

1. What are the main goals for Project UNIFY® in your school/district?

At Hannah Caldwell, we continually strive to provide an inclusive and welcoming learning environment where all students have the opportunity to fulfill their academic and social potential. We are excited to submit this Project UNIFY application for \$3,000 to expand services to our pre-kindergarten through grade 4 student population, focusing on inclusive sports, young leadership, and overall school engagement. Our main goals are as follows:

- To create a unified sports program that fosters both athletic skills and team building
- To identify young leaders who model and encourage respect for and acceptance of all peers
- To encourage social inclusion among the entire study body with an emphasis on disability awareness

2. Which Special Olympics Initiatives will be implemented in your school?

- Get Into It/ Movies That Move
- Youth Activation Committee
- Respect Campaign/Pep Rally
- Unified Sports: In-School

3. How do you plan to implement the Youth Leadership Committee, and what support will you provide your students in carrying out their Project UNIFY Programs?

Although we have a young population at Hannah Caldwell, we believe that our oldest students are mature enough to participate on an in-school, supervised leadership committee that promotes the unification of all students. After collecting feedback from teachers and guidance counselors, we will identify two students from each mainstream grade 3 and grade 4 class, who will act as youth leaders. These committee members will be recognized for showing compassion for others and enhancing the culture of their classrooms.

We have several highly experienced staff members who can lead this committee. They include guidance counselors who teach social skills and help combat bullying in school as well as regular and special education teachers who encourage integration and friendship in their classrooms.

We will identify two staff committee leaders and six student committee members (youth leaders) and provide this information by October 31 via the Youth Activation Committee form.

The Youth Leadership Committee will meet monthly to discuss progress within the three Project UNIFY components (sports, leadership, and whole-school engagement). Youth leaders will begin setting examples for their peers immediately. Such behaviors will include becoming a gym buddy during physical education and befriending a child with special needs during recess—two specific project plans outlined in our inclusive sports

component. These leaders will also help plan and implement the pep rallies included in our whole-school engagement component, outlined in further detail in question 5.

Overall, the student leaders will represent their best selves throughout the entire school day and encourage the same tolerance and kindness from their peers. In June 2015, we will reward these students with a luncheon led by Principal Kathy DiGiovanni, who will provide each student with a certificate of appreciation for their leadership services. Lunch will be provided by the Hannah Caldwell cafeteria.

4. How will you fulfill the inclusive sport component?

We have two goals for fulfilling the inclusive sport component of this program: 1) more integrated physical education that includes preparing disabled pre-kindergarten students for eventual entry into integrated physical education and 2) inclusive recess.

Inclusive Physical Education

We are pleased to report that Hannah Caldwell already offers integrated physical education for grades K-4 that joins students from self-contained classes with those from regular mainstream classes. In these classes, we encourage students to mentor classmates who have intellectual or physical disabilities, focusing on collaboration rather than competition.

As part of Project UNIFY, we will expand these positive relationships for all students in class. In addition, we will give free resources to our physical education teachers, provided by Project UNIFY/Special Olympics New Jersey, that offer activity suggestions and coaching tips on encouraging teamwork and acceptance of others.

In addition, we would like to provide opportunities for integrated classes for special education and regular education students. Through materials from the Young Athletes Kit, preschool students will be better prepared for the integrated experience. The equipment will help students develop physically and socially. Introducing a program designed to increase physical movement will better prepare these young students for integrated physical education classes in PreK to 4th grade.

Inclusive Recess

Another area where we want to incorporate a unified sport component is recess time for grades K-4 students. For 20 minutes each day, these students receive a mental health break on our school playground, which is meant for them to release energy, socialize, and prepare for additional academics. Although our playground provides a fitting environment for these purposes, it lacks the resources to fulfill them effectively. With only the asphalt to walk on, students naturally form their own social groups. This result has an isolating impact on our special needs children, many who lack the skills needed to converse and emotionally connect with others.

A generous grant from Special Olympics New Jersey will allow us to purchase board games, soft balls, drawing chalk, and other engaging resources that will attract all types of students, while encouraging physical well-being and equality. We will assist the lunch aides who supervise recess time by modeling ways to integrate children with these various activities. We will also enlist the help of our very important youth leaders, who

will take the initiative to include students who have disabilities and encourage their friends to replicate this positive behavior. Over the grant period, we expect to see a significant difference in the way all children interact during recess time because we have provided a more encouraging social climate.

5. What is your plan for whole-school engagement? How will you incorporate the Respect Campaign?

The staff of Hannah Caldwell work together to encourage school unity and spirit among all grade levels. In the first two weeks of this new school year, all classes participated in Kindergarten Color Day, an initiative in which staff members and students wore an article of clothing that matched a specific color for that day. The purpose was to help the kindergarten students learn their major colors. This type of schoolwide support that encourages outreach and the sharing of skills aligns with the whole-school engagement component of Project UNIFY. Our plans for this area are to increase school education about disability awareness within classes and during school pep rallies.

Classroom Education

To increase overall engagement of students, we will implement the initiative, Get Into It/Movies That Move, within all grades. Homeroom teachers will participate by using the age-appropriate lessons, activities, and video offered by Project UNIFY/Special Olympics New Jersey at least twice a month. All lessons will teach the importance of acceptance and inclusion. Teachers will have flexibility in how they create their lessons and at what times of day they provide them. During faculty meetings, teachers will have the opportunity to share feedback on the initiative, including success stories and suggestions for future lesson plans.

School Pep Rallies

Our other plan to foster whole-school participation is to hold at least three pep rallies throughout the grant year, with the goal of completing two by June 2015. Approximately 540 students and 30 teachers will attend. The major focus will be respect, which is not a new concept for these students since we have run district-wide presentations on antibullying. To encourage enthusiasm for this new school event, students will be allowed to create posters and banners during art class using our current school supplies. Our youth leaders will assist with the artwork and also during the pep rallies, which will include helping students get seated and focused. With funding, we would also like to purchase school spirit items such as buttons with safe backing or flags that illustrate our respect focus. These items would be distributed to students prior to each rally.

In addition, and again with financial support, we would like to hire guest speakers for the rallies. Principal DiGiovanni knows two motivational speakers who specialize in encouraging young children to understand others and accept their differences. These speakers would support the already enthusiastic culture that we have at Hannah Caldwell and further reinforce our mission to unify our student body.

6. If your school is currently involved with your local Special Olympics New Jersey Program, please tell us how. Include the sports you practice and the number of athletes, Unified partners and volunteers.

Currently, Hannah Caldwell is not involved with our local Special Olympics New Jersey Program. We hope to establish this partnership in the 2014-2015 academic year.

7. Please describe your plan for long-term sustainability for Project UNIFY in your school.

We are confident that a one-time grant from Special Olympics New Jersey will provide us with resources that we can sustain long-term. The physical equipment purchased for our self-contained pre-kindergarten class and our recess playground, our two areas in most critical need of financial support, will provide us with several years of use. We will ensure that all equipment is used correctly, maintained, and stored safely and consistently to maximize its longevity.

The education that we will gain and pass down to future generations of students and staff at Hannah Caldwell will be timeless. We expect that the many novel activities, such as the interactive classroom resources and gym partnerships, will become a regular part of our already inclusive culture.

8. What other schools in your district are participating in Project UNIFY? What are your plans to collaborate with them?

As we get Project UNIFY up and running, our hope is to discuss our successes with other partnering district schools and address any challenges so that we can be as effective as possible. Such collaboration may include a meeting held every two months with all school liaisons and principals, where we can share our resources and knowledge. We also hope to extend the program to nonparticipating schools in the district over time, which we can easily initiate by reporting our experiences at meetings held specifically for school principals and Special Services Department members.

We hope to provide social interaction between students as well as create a welcoming atmosphere with in our school for all types of students with special needs. Project Unify will provide funding for our current club, "special Olympics to create activities and awareness to both our club members and school community.

3. How do you plan to implement the Youth Leadership Committee, and what support will you provide your students in carrying out their Project UNIFY Programs?

Burnet Middle School plans to implement the Youth Leadership Committee by re-modeling our current club known as the Special Olympics Club. In the past we used to fund raise and donate money towards the Special Olympics. With the Youth Leadership Committee, we will create awareness throughout the school by creating a Respect Campaign / Disabilities Awareness Spirit Week. We will create fund-raisers and activities to help financially support the Project Unify Program. We will invite speakers to speak to our student community. We will create social events and inclusion activities to help unify the special education students with our student body. Students will meet everyday during homeroom to socially interact and create a relationship with our multiply disabled students.





4. How will you fulfill the inclusive sport component?

Students will partake in a one time a month inclusion gym period. Students will also attend two bowling trips a year with our class. Students will also be asked to join our class in different activities during the year during their physical education program. Students who are committed to our Project Unify Program will also be asked to join us in an end of the year Field Day which will include several athletic competitions and a barbecue celebration of our success.

5. What is your plan for whole-school engagement? How will you incorporate the Respect Campaign?

Burnet Middle School with team up with our current Committee PBSIS. (Positive Behavior Supports in Schools.) We will run a week long spirit week filled with a "Theme of the Week, Theme of the Day." This will include hat day, jersey day, dress like a twin day, wear purple day, crazy hair day etc." We will create a bingo board of positive tasks that can be completed throughout the week, if the board is full students will receive a prize. Special Lion's Loot will be provided to students who participate in our Respect Campaign Spirit Week, which can be later raffled off for large prizes. We also hope to bring in a guest speaker who can speak about Respect and create awareness for Student's with Disabilities.

At this time Burnet Middle School is not involved with our local Special Olympics. Last year we donated \$100.00 towards the Special Olympics and sponsored a teacher during the Polar Bear Plunge in Seaside, NJ.

Our Youth Leadership Committee / Club will meet everyday during homeroom. Students will interact with our multiply disabled students. Once a month on Friday's students will meet to discuss fund-raising activities to help financially sustain the club. Students will talk about bake sales, donations, teacher / student dress down days etc. Students will fund raise to help sustain the club financially and continue to have enough support for our inclusion activities as well as our Respect Campaign awareness week.




