Project Unify Grant - Field Day Proposal

Every year schools in our district work closely with Project Unify & The Special Olympics Foundation. For the fourth consecutive year the Board of Education has approved our Project Unify Grant allowing us to continue to make strides with our inclusion sports programs and activities. Grants have been provided to Burnet Middle School, Union High School, Kawameeh Middle School and Jefferson School. Foundational programs have been in progress or are just beginning in these schools and our goal, ultimately, is to include a Project Unify or Special Olympics program or activity in every school in Union Township.

The grant allows the school district to promote inclusion of disabled and non-disabled students through physical education, peer activities, and unified sports. In addition, the grant provides monies necessary for schools to plan and implement programs where students work together to compete and play. The long term goal is for districts to create a lifelong plan in which they can implement teams, practices and coaches that support these Unified Events.

Initially, Project Unify started with Burnet Middle and during our second year, we expanded our resources, participants, programs, and schools to include Union High School and Jefferson. This year Kawameeh has received grant monies building our district's Project Unify numbers.

Many people in our community share a common love for Play Unified Special Olympics. This year we will be taking the grant one step further. We hope to include disabled vets of NJ, parents of attending students, and the Union Township Police Department. As we continue to build our community of parents and students in our schools, we hope to spread the word of inclusion and acceptance throughout the town.

Respect Week Campaign -

May 12th - UHS / KMS/ Burnet / Jefferson - Assembly

This assembly will be used to kick off our Disabilities Awareness Campaign. This assembly will provide guest speakers and information to all students throughout these schools. The purpose is to show the importance of accepting others. It will be used to kick off our spirit week in which we hope to spread awareness and bring the student population closer together.

"Attitudes are the Real Disability"

Have you ever questioned whether or not you should open the door for someone ahead of you who is in a wheelchair? Or have you felt uncomfortable sitting next to someone with an apparent physical disability? These experiences are very common and ones that many of us have worked through. The need for people to be educated about people living with disabilities is ever growing in our society. At some point in all of our lives, we will be confronted with a situation where we will have to serve the needs of someone who has a disability. Sadly, stereotypes and prejudice impact the way in which we interact with and serve others who have disabilities. Discrimination and negative attitudes towards people with disabilities come from a general lack of information and misunderstanding about who these people are. More information must be provided focusing on the best practices for serving their unique needs as individuals.

In an effort to educate more people in our school district, Burnet Middle School is hosting their first ever Disabilities Awareness Week. We hope to promote awareness to our student population to help educate them about appropriate attitudes and interactions needed when serving people with disabilities.

Please read the following to your homeroom on Tuesday - May 16th. **Tuesday, May 16th**

- Theme of the day: Teamwork!
 - Wear your favorite sports jersey to show you're a TEAM player
 - Lion's loot will be distributed today for students who wear something team inspired and who are team players throughout the day
 - o Team player examples: Be cooperative, not competitive, listen to your peers, be respectful to everyone, follow directions, and much more!

Home Room:

Hearing impairments include everything from not being able to hear certain sounds to being totally deaf. In most cases, a hearing loss doesn't simply mean that sounds are not loud enough. It usually means that sounds are garbled or unclear. A hearing aid may make speech <u>louder</u>, but usually will not make speech <u>clearer</u>.

Activity 1 - Not being able to hear

You need: a pair of ear plugs for each student, a computer with sound, I-pod, fan or anything else that can make "white noise".

What to do:

Show students how to put in the earplugs.

Put on the "white noise". If using a TV, put it on a station with no reception and turn up the volume — loud enough to be distracting. If using a radio, set it between stations so you only hear static. If using a fan, turn it up on high. Read a long newspaper article or book passage. Read rapidly, using a soft voice, mumbling monotone, running words together and pausing in odd places. Ask students 5 questions about the content of what you read. Continue talking quickly in a soft, mumbling voice. Remove ear plugs, turn off white noise and discuss (in a normal voice) how not being able to hear clearly felt.

- Lets all Step Out Of Our Comfort Zone and Learn about Students With Different Disabilities.
- Wear your pajama gear to show your support for Students and Adults with Disabilities.
- Let's Be Comfortable with being Uncomfortable –as we spread awareness of disabilities this week.
- Please hand out Lion's Loot to those who participate.

Home Room:

Communication disorders are disabilities that keep a person from being able to speak or make their speech understood. This can be caused by many different disabilities or injuries. Some people with difficulty speaking may use sign language, gestures or small pictures they carry with them.

Activity 1 - Different words

If you have students in your class who speak a different language, have them stand in front of the class and say one sentence in their language. Have the class try to guess what was said. If you have more than one student who speaks the same foreign language, have them carry on a short conversation. Then have the class try to decide what was said. Discuss how it feels to not be able to understand something. How quickly did the class give up? What are some other ways they could have tried to communicate? How is this similar to people with disabilities that can talk but are hard to understand?

 - Students will receive lion's loot throughout the day for the craziest hair or mismatched outfits you see!!!!

Home Room: There are a large variety of different **physical disabilities**, all of which can range from a mild problem to complete immobility. Many people will have more than one disability, such as not being able to use their legs or hands.

Activity 1 - In a wheelchair (Chair)

Use a chair. Have each student take a turn sitting in the chair. Have them try different activities:

Try Reaching for things on a book shelf

Kicking a Ball

Throwing a ball from a seated position

Writing on the chalk board / smart board

Think about what it would be like:

- Going through the lunch line
- Getting a book off the top shelf in the library
- Playing a game in the gym or playground (soccer, basketball, chase, etc.)
- Going to the bathroom
- Going through an outside door
- Being in a group where everyone else is standing up

Discuss how being in the wheelchair felt. What would have made things better?

Thursday - May 18th

Theme of the day: Wear Blue

- Hand out Lion's Loot to students who wear Blue ©
- Today is Autism Awareness Day Talk to Student's About Autism and help spread awareness.

Autism is a developmental disability that usually appears during the first three years of life. The cause is unknown. It affects how a person's brain works, but not all people with autism are affected the same way. When a person has autism, they may have problems:

- letting you know what they want;
- · thinking;
- · understanding what other people say or want;
- ignoring sounds;
- ignoring things or people that are moving;
- ignoring lights;
- being touched;
- understanding social rules;
- showing affection;
- controlling their feelings;
- knowing how to play with other kids; and
- · dealing with changes.

Autism is a "spectrum disorder." That means that not everyone with autism has all the problems. One person may have three of the problems listed while another person has only one. Some people with autism struggle to learn. Other people with autism are very smart and can do complicated math when they are 3 years old. Some people with autism have trouble being touched while others like to hug.

Many people with autism like to do things in the same order all the time and have things arranged the same way. This helps them stay calm.

Other people with autism have a very hard time ignoring noises, especially if they are upset or in a new situation. They may try to calm themselves by rocking, moaning, talking loudly or even screaming. The moaning, talking or screaming helps them drown out the other noises so they can calm down. They may also try to go under a desk or in a small, dark place where they feel safer.

Friday – May $19^{\rm th}$ – Wear Maroon or Respect Week Shirt To Show Spirit & Pride of Accepting Others With Disabilities

Teachers:

Please read the following to your homeroom on Friday May 19th.

Home Room - Vision impairments include things like being near-sighted or far-sighted that are correctable with glasses. It can also mean more serious problems like blindness or problems that are only helped a little by glasses.

Activity 1- Blindness

Home Room - You need:

A good blindfold.

A room with several occupied chairs and one or more vacant chairs. Put odd obstacles on the way to the chair, and/or face the chair in an unexpected direction. Leave the door halfway open.

What to do

Explain that you will need 2 students - a "guide" and a "blind person." You will be re-arranging the room. The guide's job is to help the blind person come into the room and go to the chair without running into anything. They can tell them how to do it and can also touch them to help guide their way.

Make sure the blindfold is on and foolproof. Send the 2 volunteers into the hall and re-arrange the room. The vacant chair should not be too easy to get to.

Hint: Most "guides" grab the blind person and push them around. This usually results in the "blind" person running into things. "Guides" usually don't describe the path, and say "look out" instead of "stop" at major obstacles. When the chair is reached, "guides" usually spin the "blind" person around and push them into the seat, then leaves without explanation.
