### b. Learning Acceleration- \$190,834

Seventy-five percent of those funds will be used to support research-based academic enrichment activities such as summer learning academies, school year learning acceleration academies, and 1:1 tutoring. Of the portion dedicated to academic enrichment for students districts will be required to spend 75% on STEM related activities and experiences, as well as spend 25% on activities related to literacy and the arts. The remaining twenty-five percent of the Learning Acceleration Grant funds will be used for activities that support the broader learning ecosystem, such as

evidence-based strategies to cultivate a growth mindset in students, professional learning for educators in the use of formative assessments and the use of extended instructional time to effectively scaffold students' learning, as well integrate parents and educators into a multi-tiered system of supports.

### Mental Health Supports & Services -\$45,000

These funds will support schools in building or enhancing a continuum of school-based mental health services for students, in coordination with existing county and local services, and supports for educators.

### Release of End-of-Year Activities Guidance

Today, April 26, 2021, Governor Murphy announced an increase in gathering limits for outdoor and indoor end-of-year events, effective May 10, 2021. The outdoor gathering limit will increase to 500 persons and the capacity limit for large venues with fixed seating for 1,000 or more people is increased to 50%. Additionally, Governor Murphy announced increased limits for indoor catered events, such as proms, to 50% of room capacity and with a maximum of 250 people, and the ability of outdoor and indoor venues to open dance floors at these private catered events. An Executive Order effectuating these changes is forthcoming.

In anticipation of these changes, the New Jersey Department of Education (NJDOE) is releasing <u>guidance</u> to assist Local Education Agencies (LEAs) in the planning of end-of-year activities that meet applicable New Jersey health and safety standards. This guidance addresses various types of activities, including but not limited to graduation and promotional ceremonies, student recognition ceremonies, and proms.





## Close of SY2020-2021 Testing Updates

- At the start of April, the district submitted local testing data as required by the NJDOE. The testing data identified numbers of students scoring below, at, and above grade level in ELA, Math, and Science based on i-Ready, STAR360, and NJDOE Start Strong Assessment results.
- NJSLA-SCI will not be administered in Spring 2021, however the ACCESS and On April 14, the NJDOE announced that the NJSLA-ELA, NJSLA-MATH, and DLM will still be administered.
- The district will be administering the third diagnostic test in i-Ready (K-8) and STAR360 (9-12) during MP4.
- No formal final exams will be given; standards-focused assessments will continue to be given at the classroom level.

# September/October 2021 Testing Updates



### NJDOE ANNOUNCES NJSLA WILL NOT BE ADMINISTERED IN SPRING 2021

In response to NJDOE's request for a waiver for NJSLA testing this Spring, the United States
Department of Education determined, due to the impact of COVID-19, that the Start Strong assessments that Union administered in December of 2020 in ELA, Math, and Science meets the federal testing requirement for the 2020-2021 school year.

As a result, the New Jersey Student Learning Assessments (NJSLA) Spring Administration will be canceled. The Start Strong assessments in ELA, Math, and Science will be administered in fall 2021.

Please note that the United States Department of Education did not waive requirements to administer the Dynamic Learning Maps (DLM) and the ACCESS/Alternate ACCESS for ELLs assessments. Therefore, DLM and ACCESS administration will continue with an administration window from April 5 to June 11, 2021.






